


Cervical Screening – Reduce Your Risk of Developing Cervical Cancer


It is important to go to regular cervical screening, even for young, healthy women who have been vaccinated against HPV

Regular cervical screening may detect cell changes before they develop into cervical cancer. Cell changes are not the same as cervical cancer and usually do not give symptoms. Cell changes can be easily treated. Half of the women who develop cervical cancer have rarely or never attended cervical screening.

CervicalScreen Norway – Start a Good Habit

It is recommended that women between the ages of 25 and 69 should go for regular cervical screening. The aim is to prevent cervical cancer that affects women of any age. Regular cervical screening significantly reduces the chances of developing cervical cancer. If you have already gone for cervical screening, you will receive a reminder from CervicalScreen Norway when it is time for the next one. 



HPV is the cause of cervical cancer

Serious cell changes and cervical cancer are most often caused by a long-term infection by the human papillomavirus (HPV). HPV is the most common sexually transmitted infection. It is important to go for regular cervical screening even if you have been vaccinated against HPV.



A cervical screening test is conducted during a gynaecological examination

The examination only takes a few minutes. It is not painful but may feel a little uncomfortable. The collected sample is sent to a laboratory where it is examined under a microscope to look for abnormalities. Your doctor usually gets the test result within a month. In the case of an abnormal test result, your doctor will provide you with information for further follow-up. If the test comes back normal, it is recommended that you take the test again in three years. CervicalScreen Norway will send you a reminder when it is time for a new test.



Your GP takes the cervical screening test

Contact your regular GP's office to book an appointment. The examination is usually performed by your GP. Some women find it awkward to take this kind of test with their GP. If this applies to you, talk to your doctor's office about alternatives. It is often possible to take the test with another doctor in the same office. In special cases, it may be possible to get a referral to a gynaecologist. You have to pay a deductible fee for the examination.



Important considerations before the cervical screening test

Avoid taking the test during menstruation. Avoid the use of tampons, all types of vaginal creams and medicines 24 hours before the test, as these may lead to incorrect test results. Some words of advice: Feel free to bring along a friend. Some find it convenient to wear a dress.



No cervical screening test is 100% reliable

Regularly attending cervical screening reduces the risk of developing cervical cancer significantly, but serious cell changes may remain undetected for various reasons. Even if your test result is normal, it is important that you contact your doctor immediately if you experience symptoms such as persistent irregular bleeding, bleeding after intercourse, abnormal discharge, or persistent abdominal pain.



Reservation and privacy

The Cancer Registry of Norway stores information about your test results. You have the right to object to the storage of information related to normal results in the Cancer Registry. You also have the right to object to the sharing of your test result history with healthcare professionals who request access to it when treating you. You can request access to your personal information stored at the Cancer Registry.
